- PREVIOUS CONTRACT EXPIRED JULY 1, 2022
- NEGOTIATIONS ONGOING BETWEEN ILWU AND PMA
- CARGO CONTINUES TO MOVE WITHOUT DISRUPTION
- AGREEMENT REACHED ON HEALTH BENEFITS

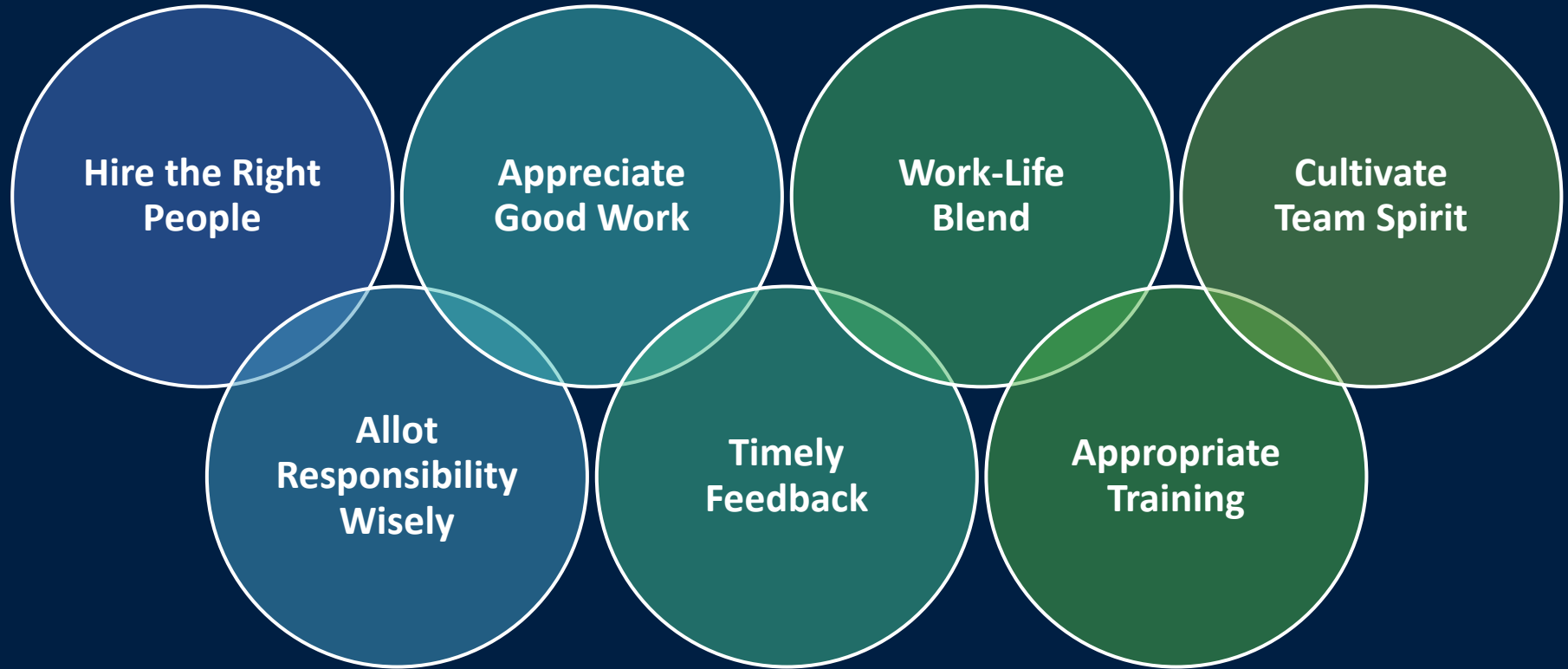

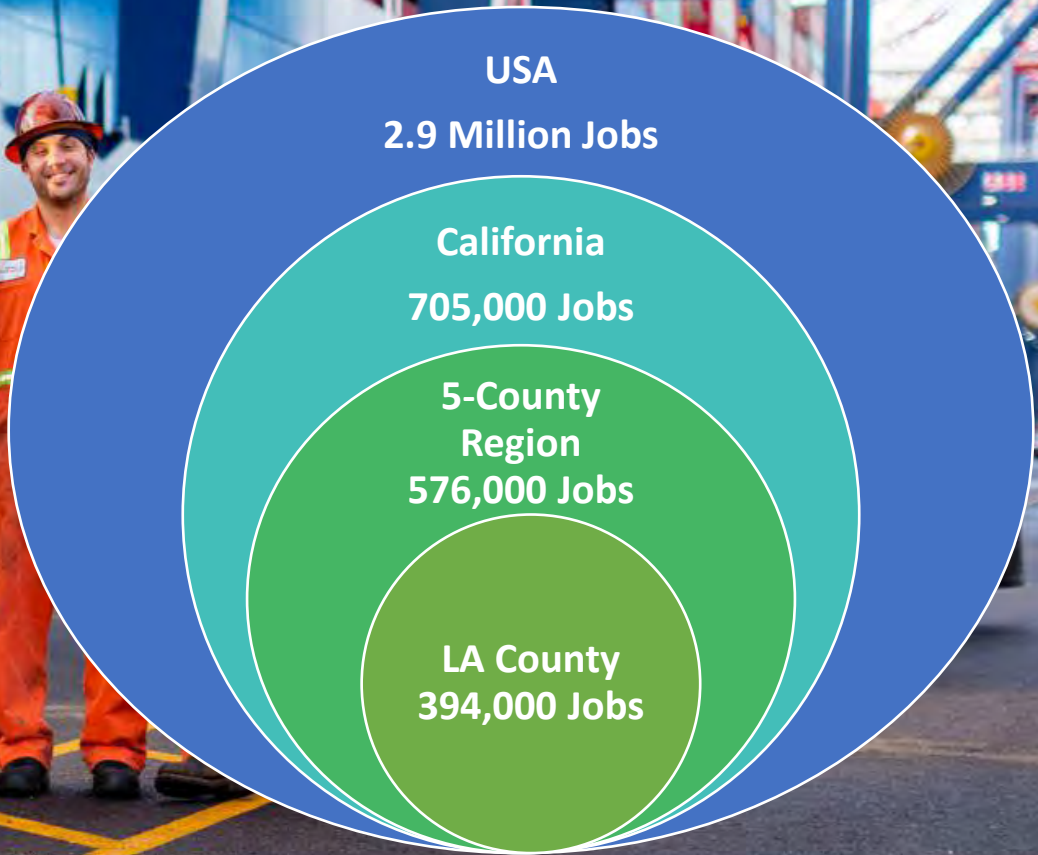

RIPPLE EFFECT



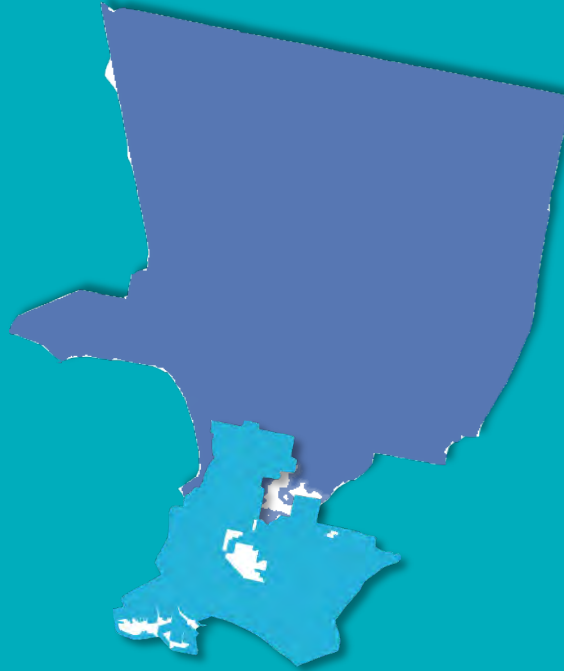

ECONOMIC IMPACT SUMMARY

CITY OF LONG BEACH

- **51,090** jobs supported, providing **\$3.2 billion** in income
- **\$5.1 billion** in value added to goods
- **\$9.0 billion** in output to the economy



LOS ANGELES COUNTY

- **394,220** jobs supported, providing **\$22.1 billion** in income
- **\$35.3 billion** in value added to goods
- **\$63.8 billion** in output to the economy

ECONOMIC IMPACT SUMMARY

5-COUNTY AREA

- **576,350** jobs supported, providing **\$30.8 billion** in income
- **\$49.5 billion** in value added to the economy
- **\$88.5 billion** in economic output



STATE OF CALIFORNIA

- **705,430** jobs supported, providing **\$38.7 billion** in income
